Check out the exciting new range of fashion colours from Resene.

here are experts who track and predict colour trends for fashion, products and interiors. Then there are colours that are borne out of the collective consciousness. Millennial pink was one such colour and as we become more visually sophisticated, post our lives to our Instagram accounts and seek change at a faster pace, more such colours will emerge.

It's exciting and galvanising to be part of the trends, and not merely the receiver of them. It makes the job of Resene colour experts dynamic too, constantly planning paint colour and wallpaper collections and formulating new colours.

Key colour trends

As communities galvanise over social and political movements you can see design trends going bolder, with true reds, or stormy blues and dark brooding tones. Check out Resene Havoc, Resene Coast and Resene Dark Web.


Warmer colours are generally on the rise, from mustard and earthy neutrals, to creamy whites and rich browns. Such colours carry the promise of global exploration and porous borders. So often seen in indigenous art and cultures, they are rich in history, grounding, and reassuring. Try Resene Influential, Resene Eighth Stonewashed and Resene Tablelands.

The visual antithesis of this rich palette is one awash with mild greys and weathered blues. Soothing and cleansing, these soulful tones comfort us as we retreat from a hyper-digitally coloured and busy world. Try Resene Silver Chalice, Resene Slipstream and Resene Half Dusted Blue

Millennial pink was a colour borne out of the global

movement toward gender fluidity. It has now become more nuanced and widespread, evolving into more interesting dusky shades of blush and peach. It's an example of how a design trend evolves and becomes more sophisticated alongside the generation which embraced it. The new fashion fandeck is rich in dusky pink peach options, from Resene Just Dance to Resene Shabby Chic and Resene Despacito.

Green has been emerging in homes during the past few years as our eco-consciousness grows and our yearning to connect with nature via biophilic design.

Green started strong, as clean verdant greens with loads of personality, then it turned a bit khaki and swampy. Now, it's softened even more to take a place as a versatile dusky colour that can even be used as a neutral in its softer, murkier forms.

By contrast, fresh leafy greens are a sweet, simple look coming with the promise of new growth and energy. See the difference between Resene Helix and Resene Aura, at left.

Other influences

Where do we draw the boundaries between private and public in this time of multiple social platforms? Are we creating spaces for our own enjoyment or to share with the world? We revel in self-expression then want the product of that self-expression to look good through a camera lens and postable to Instagram.

The resulting influence on our design trends can be seen in the rise of fun, exciting and highly personalised choices that are pure self-expression, whether it's in pops of bright colour or unexpected combinations of colour and texture.

The popularity of wallpaper and its many expressions is no surprise. We want lively spaces that tell a story, or walls with dimension and character.

We like to understand the story behind the objects and materials we use and in our revolt against single-use items and a disposable society, we are reinventing and upcycling furniture, accessories and second-hand finds with a lick of paint or stain.

The small-living movement initially led to interiors being safely neutral and visually uncluttered. But we've come to learn that peaceful surroundings don't have to be monastic. We can use tonal nuances in colour and objects to create layered yet calming surroundings. The palette may be pared back but a shift away from stark whites to creamier tones like Resene Double Blanc or Resene Double Villa White keeps it soft and welcoming.

In the end

Evolution is key in design trends. Most of us don't suddenly flip from stark white minimalism to painting our living rooms in the new bold brick reds overnight. It's an incremental process.

In the end, though trends shift with the times and global mood, the point is still personalisation. You will find the trend that speaks most to you when you see a colour or a design – a bold geometric on the wall or a freeform painterly pattern perhaps. It seems so obvious you wonder why you didn't think of it before. From there you take it and make it your own.

going dark

Dark exteriors have always held appeal, and now that the trend has moved away from pure blacks and charcoals to more character dark colours, deep slate blue tones have come into their own. The cladding on this house is Resene Safehaven, a blue that has interesting stormy depths but which looks good with a variety of accent colours. Here, vibrantly coloured pots bring a Moroccan or Pacifica vibe to the courtyard, painted in Resene Daredevil (deep orange), Resene Party Zone (bright orange), Resene Pink Ribbon, Resene Lazy River (blue) and Resene Poppy (red).

A series of hook racks offer handy storage, and are painted in Resene Lazy River. The bench seat is finished in Resene Furniture and Decking Oil, which is specially formulated for exterior use so that timber stays looking good. The concrete has been finished in Resene Non-Skid Deck & Path paint tinted to Resene Traffic. This gives a gritty texture for non-slip safety.

The ever-popular Resene testpot is changing its lid – with a clear viewing panel so you see what colour is inside, without having to open the testpot. The overall size and pricing is the same, just with a new lid and a flatter finish, which provides a little extra grip when opening the lid. Always remember that wet paint doesn't look identical to dry paint so the colour through the viewing hole is just a guideline. Use the Resene colour charts or the colour library folders to view the colour when drv.

or advertising executive Marcelle Baker decorating her home was more like a passion project than a job that had to be done. "Dreaming up interiors is definitely my creative outlet," says the Auckland mother of two. When it came to pushing the 'go' button on the renovation of the Onehunga villa she shares with husband Simon Baker and children Lulu and Gus, there was one thing that topped her list. It was going to feature some strong colour.



Marcelle spied similar style barn doors while researching renovation options online and added them to her must-have list. "It's so great being able to pull those doors shut when we have people over. And when the doors are closed they actually become a feature of the room."

It was love at first sight when Marcelle saw the century-old villa at an open home 10 years ago. "As soon as I walked through the doors I felt at home. Its wrap-around-verandas and fretwork reminded me of the farm homestead that I grew up in. It has amazing original features like high pressed tin ceilings and a fantastic arch in the hallway. It's also got a large back section and a north-facing aspect. It had been re-piled and partly renovated, including the addition of an ensuite and walk-in wardrobe, which made it instantly liveable."

recognising what was original and new, but in a really complementary way."

Resene Alabaster acts as a canvas for Marcelle's interior design ideas, allowing bold pieces such as the petrel-blue sofa to stand out. The contemporary open-plan living room, dining area and kitchen have given the family the luxury of two living spaces. The library, in the original part of the home, doubles as a television room and can be closed off from the new part of the house by a cavity slider.

When it came to choosing the paint for Lulu's room, Marcelle's colour confidence came into play. The striking green-blue walls in Resene Reservoir are the perfect foil for the pops of pink (Resene Glamour Puss) and yellow (Resene Wild Thing) that repeat the home's cool and warm colour theme.

The new living area is cleverly zoned to cater for different eating, sitting and gathering activities but one thing is clear - the beating heart of this family dwelling is the white, marble, brass and oak kitchen. Marcelle loves to cook and it was important for her to get this space right. It features custom-designed touches that are pure Marcelle such as the black pendant lighting strung above the kitchen island. She had the iron fittings cut to her specifications by a local engineer.

"I love being in the kitchen on the weekends and Simon loves to be out in the garden, with the kids running between the two. The house is really great for hosting friends and family because of the separate social spaces. I wouldn't change a thing," says Marcelle. **H**







The **Residential Interior Maestro** (runner up) award went to Sonia van der Haar of Lymesmith for a house that used bold colour as well as featuring an abstract mural that brought many of the colours together (left).

The kitchen wall is painted in Resene Countdown while the mural features Resene Unwind, Resene Mustang, Resene Quarter Pearl Lusta, Resene Triple Tea and Resene Prussian Blue, as well as a Resene custom made pink and green. Resene Countdown and Resene Mustang are from older colour collections; try Resene Raging Bull and Resene Dynamite as alternatives.

The judges commented: "Adventurous and fun, this home deliberately plays with colour to celebrate the owners' individuality. Dual colour palettes are interwoven and respond to artwork, furniture and each other in unexpected ways. Colour rules were made to be broken. Both the **Residential Interior** category and the **Residential Exterior** award were won by Gerald Parsonson and Zac Vermuelen of Wellington-based Parsonson Architects for a Te Horo bach that used a variety of Resene colours both inside and out.

environment. Yet this home is more colourful than first meets the eye. Working within covenants, the colour use is inspiring, where many people would settle for neutrals, said the judges. The colours used are Resene Canvas and Resene Half Delta on the fibre cement cladding with Resene Ecru White, Resene Tussock and Resene Boulevard on the battens.

Inside the bach, the combination of materials and colourways brings with it an instant fun holiday vibe with a sense of relaxation and escape. Said the judges: "This bach feels at home with nature on the inside, as it does on the outside. The perfect antidote to city life." The kitchen pictured features Resene Crisp Green, Resene Cararra, Resene Boulevard and Resene Half Delta, Resene Boulevard is from an older colour collection; try Resene Sorrento as an alternative.

The Residential Exterior Maestro (runner up) award went to Annabel Cropper, of Nott Architects, for a totally unexpected use of bright Resene Picton Blue for part of the exterior of a house which was otherwise finished in Resene Scoria.

The rural leanings of the streetscape acts as the gatekeeper to the colour within so that the bold blue is only enjoyed by those who make it past the front door. Colour has helped this mother and daughter team turn design ideas into a thriving business.

ow do you make your design business stand out? Add more colour! That's been the experience of mother and daughter team Mary Mortland and Anna Tweedie, the talented Mt Maunganui-based duo behind Inscribe Design.

Inscribe Design was born four years ago when Anna, with her children now at school and kindy, was looking to return to work. Her wish list was to find work with enough flexibility to allow for family commitments and, if possible, allow her to use her creative flair.

"I really wanted to do something I loved and felt passionate about, rather than just 'working for the man'."

Mum Mary, who shares that artistic flair, suggested they look for a business they could run together. They found a local hobby business based around a laser-cut machine which was for sale. They bought it and started experimenting. Four years later the pair have a thriving enterprise creating beautiful laser-cut wood designs from sustainable bamboo. Their product inventory includes everything from cake toppers and coasters to wall hangings and intricate clocks.

But what makes their designs stand-out from other laser-cut products, and is one of the reasons for their on-going success, says Anna, is their use of colour. "Other laser-cut businesses often stick to just bare wood or acrylic. We really wanted to stand out from the others and offer something unique.

"We both really love colour, so we added colour," Anna says. For that, they turned to Resene paints.

"We love the range of colours Resene offers," says Mary. She says they knew very little about paint when they started out and were helped hugely by the knowledgeable staff at their local Resene ColorShop when it came to choosing finishes and paint types.

When selecting colours, Anna and Mary are guided

"There is a real trend among customers for items with a pop of really bright colour, particularly in things like coasters. It really works," says Anna. "Sometimes the design comes first then we'll think about what colour will work," says Mary. "And sometimes a colour will inspire a design. It's a mix of both." Customers will also request a specific colour, which they can create as a bespoke product.

The Inscribe customer base ranges from corporates to individuals and their biggest-selling item at the moment is the beautiful Te Reo clock, shown on the wall behind Anna and Mary at left. In fact, all Inscribe's clocks have become so popular they have recently upgraded to a second larger laser-cut machine to accommodate the increased demand.

Despite all the growth the business is still run from Anna's Mt Maunganui property. "We are busy and popular enough that we could take things to a larger industrial level. But we don't want that," says Anna. "We want to keep it just mum and I, and be able to still have that hands-on creative input. We put so much love into these products.


"The biggest reward for us is the genuinely lovely comments from our customers. We love receiving pictures of our creations in their homes.

othing else symbolises the relaxed holiday lifestyle quite like the bach. Or crib as they call it in the south, or holiday home if you live beyond our shores.

Whether by the beach, lake or mountain, this modest dwelling is an iconic part of our history and culture, and sums up the meaning of escape from the city and ordinary working life.

Baches became popular in the 1950s when roads improved and cars became more common, giving access to more remote places. They were almost always small and made of cheap and sometimes recycled materials like fibrolite, corrugated iron or used timber. As we've become more affluent and building codes stricter, they've grown more sophisticated. Yet still, many bach owners want to reflect a simpler, backto-nature way of life that departs from the everyday.

"A bach represents a form of nostalgia harking back to a simpler life. It's a sanctuary from urban business," says designer Liz Kerby of Lizzie K & Co. "It's a touchstone, a soulful place where you can add your own personality and character."

Wellington architect Gerald Parsonson has no time for those who plonk standard homes from suburbia by the sea for holidays. "It grates. It destroys part of the beauty of the area."

When designing baches, he takes inspiration from the environment. "Every site is different. If it's a steep site in the Marlborough Sounds, we're influenced by how it fits on the land. If it's a flat coastal site, then it's a different dwelling.

"There's a playfulness to these holiday homes that comes from the history," says Gerald. "Having it beachy and basic is a good aspiration. Furnishings can be quite mad. It's nice to turn up and kick sand through the house and not be hung up about kids and dog activity."

Layouts are determined as much by relaxed attitudes as modest budgets. Hence the lack of front entries, says Gerald. "Baches can be quite casual in the way bedrooms come off living areas and so on. They have multi-purpose spaces. A bedroom might be behind sliding doors.

"You can use basic materials and colour more playfully. Old baches were typically slapped together with fibro-cement cladding. It was easy to knock them up in plywood, so we've tried to use these sorts of materials. They're really low maintenance and easy to paint," he says.

Designer Anna Major from Haus of Design in New Plymouth also encourages her clients to be sympathetic to the surroundings. "In Taranaki, we're inundated with beauty in our mountain and coastal areas." For remote locations, security is often key, says Anna. When she designed a new bach in Oakura recently, it was about creating the ability to easily lock up and leave, so she specified sensor lights and aluminium joinery.

In regions of high salt exposure, she uses premium Resene Lumbersider on exterior walls and inside, she uses Resene SpaceCote – "you can wash it and it won't tarnish. It's a premium washable paint that



avoids a lot of fingermarks on the walls." Anna recommends hardwearing materials for easy-care. When it comes to furnishings, Anna says: "There's so much available in op shops for crockery and beachy elements. Also look for country-style furniture that's been re-upholstered. Focus on quality over quantity."

"People often like to bring the nostalgic aspect inside," says Liz Kerby. "Honest natural materials and soft sea tones are relaxing and neutral. It's an escape from the city so use rustic textures to blend with the scenery."

Liz's own bach gave her an opportunity to create a different environment to her modern city home. "We had a more textural look with second-hand finds that immediately created a sense of nostalgia that was comforting. It can be quite different depending on where the bach is located. You might have lots of stone and a schist fireplace in an alpine region or lots of whitewashed timber floors, walls and ceilings or mats on walls in a coastal region."

And because baches are all about people gathering to socialise, she says, kitchens are smaller. "After all, most cooking happens outside in summer – on barbecues, braziers or fire pits."

Vanessa Nouwens of Nes Design owns a streamlined minimalist city home and wanted completely the opposite for her Waihi bach. "You can be a bit braver with colour in a bach because you're not living with it on a daily basis."

Some of the family surf, so the bach has a relaxed surfie vibe with cane and rattan furniture and denim cushions featuring surfing brands. Edgy art prints represent the sea and surf while bags and caps on display add colourful interest. "When you don't have a lot of storage, use the vertical wall space to hang things on pegs and shelves," she suggests. H

Above and below: Architect Gerald Parsonson's clients Richard Stewart and Kerry Sexton wanted their holiday home in Te Horo, north of Wellington, to feel like a bach, not a house that happens to be at the beach. He designed a small 87m2 retreat that was economical to build in fibro-cement and batten cladding with a simple pitched roof angled to catch the nor-wester breeze and shelter from southerlies. This bach won Resene Total Colour Awards for its interior and exterior – see page 34 for the colours used.

Covenants on the subdivision restricted exterior colour options to greys and creams. However, owner Richard says: "The bach theme gave us the option to have a bit of fun and play with multiple colours." To create a relationship between the bach and the blades of grass growing out of the sand dunes, they painted vertical stripes, using a tonal colour scheme. As you turn around the house, the colours get brighter. Then they brought the colours inside to connect the two. The bedroom below features Resene Classius walls and Resene Boulevard. Resene Boulevard is from an older colour collection; try Resene Sorrento as an alternative.





reativity and a social conscience collide every day at The Paper Rain Project, resulting in a range of stunning artworks and products, many finished in Resene paints.

Founders Indigo Greenlaw and Wills Rowe both had a passion for recycling, conservation and sustainability before they met in 2013. As an art student Indigo had painted surfing longboards for friends, so she and Wills began making artwork boards from recycled wine barrels and locally grown macrocarpa.

"Recycling, conservation and sustainability were ideas I was brought up with. I grew up in a boat-access-only, off-grid community in Scotland with parents who planted native trees for a living. Wills shares these values. Being fair trade and supporting those in our supply chain is really important to us, so working with companies that support women out of sex slavery and poverty in India was the perfect fit for Paper Rain.

"The idea is to create a range of high quality, fair trade (or locally sourced/in-house made) art goods which help people to learn more about the supply chain, including the charities we donate a portion of profits to per artwork."

The small, bespoke nature of The Paper Rain Project means both Indigo and Wills wear many hats when it comes to managing the business. As well as working as



a guest artist for the board, t-shirt and tote bag artworks, "which I love", Indigo is also responsible for branding, marketing, creative direction and staff management. "No day is the same," she says.

Indigo's relationship with Resene paints goes back a long way, to her days as an art student. "I always loved the colours available and as a student, found the testpots an affordable way to get a good quality paint in a wide range of shades."

When it came to creating some of the original, ethical designs for The Paper Rain Project, Resene was a natural fit. "I love that Resene has Environmental Choice paints and that I can return my used paint cans and any unused paint to be recycled," she says.

Colour is a crucially important element in creating the art boards and other Paper Rain designs, making sure they stand out from others on the market. Indigo uses a unique mixture of laser etching, modelling compound, gold leaf and Resene paint.

"Most recently, I have been using Resene to paint a series of kākāpō board artworks, each named after a real kākāpō. We have one of the fastest declining rates of native species in the world and our birds can do with all the help they can get," says Indigo. "I hand paint each board, limiting each bird series to their living numbers. We donate a portion of profits from each board sale towards their recovery programmes.

"We have sold 22 kākāpō so far, so it's about time to release the next bird in the series. I'm thinking the huia – which will be a special edition seeing as they're already gone! A wading heron will be next."

There's no such threat of extinction for The Paper Rain Project with the year shaping up as their busiest yet, including new stores in Auckland, Wellington and Queenstown. H

any of us dream of living the bach holiday lifestyle all year round, but few of us have the opportunity to actually do so. Tim and Angela Kinnersley are the lucky ones. They've managed to not only achieve the lifestyle but also recreate the spirit of a bach they once owned and loved.

Armed with an array of soft Resene coastal blues, they have transformed a tired old cedar clad home into a magical seaside cottage. And it's just across the bay from the old bach, in a sheltered inlet north of Auckland.

The couple had holidayed in the area for many years, having friends and family to stay at their old bach, and kayaking around the tidal shoreline of the inlet. They loved the location and the community, so when it came time to make a move from the city, this is where their hearts led them.


The house they bought has a stunning view, but had a dark and sombre interior with timber ceilings and old wallpaper, while the exterior cedar cladding had been badly maintained. But Angela and Tim could see the easy potential that the house offered up. Says Angela: "We understood its age and style. We were keen on letting the house tell us what it needed rather than trying to force a style on it."

So when their builder suggested they reclad or just paint it, Tim's response was a firm no. Instead, they sought advice from a cedar restoration specialist, who suggested using Wood-X oil stain, available from

Resene ColorShops. Along with a roof and spouting now painted in Resene Gauntlet, it has worked wonders. "We're really pleased with the result, it looks like a different house, not hiding in the woods. You can see it." The old jade green joinery was also given a refresh in soft cream.

Inside, the dark vaulted timber ceilings and solid balustrades had to go. The ceilings in the main living room were brushed by hand using Resene Eighth Pearl Lusta - all 32 litres of it.

It was the start of a metamorphosis from woodsy to coastal.

Angela has developed such a passion for interiors she is now studying it. Deciding on the interiors for the house was a very personal journey, doing much of the research while on extended sick leave and undergoing treatment.

Tim saw the enjoyment it bought her, so he encouraged her to back her choices. She also sought advice from staff at the local Resene ColorShop, who suggested a palette of blues and greys. While the main living room colour changed – it's now Resene Quarter Periglacial Blue - other colours have been used

throughout the house, from Resene Half Duck Egg Blue in the bedrooms, Resene Midwinter Mist in the main bedroom, Resene Half Gull Grey in a hallway and the study, and Resene Quarter Truffle in the main bathroom and other hallways.

It now echoes the changing colours of the inlet waters. "In an inlet you get more mood and colour variation in the water. And because the house faces east, the white we chose had to be a warm white, not a cool white." Hence, the use of Resene Eighth Pearl Lusta on the ceilings, trims and kitchen cabinets. "I like that the house has a diverse range of blues and greys yet still feels like a cohesive scheme. And colours like the Resene Duck Egg Blue change character depending on the light and the amount of vegetation outside the window. They're mutable and interesting," says Angela. "Each room has its own level of light and sunshine, so we tried to pick what was right for the room."

With up to 16 different Resene testpot patches on the walls, Tim and Angela would discuss every decorating decision... "but Angela had the final say," says Tim. Above: A Cape Cod style kitchen, with Resene Eighth Pearl Lusta cabinets and Resene Quarter Periglacial Blue walls is the ideal look for this home's new style. The splashback tiles are from Tile Warehouse, chosen because they looked like rippling water.

They didn't want the house to be a homage to current trends but rather a reflection of their own tastes and the situation. The kitchen is a great example, where they could have easily gone with the currently popular island bench layout and streamlined cabinets. Instead, they retained the kitchen's original U shape and went for a Cape Cod aesthetic with panelled doors and black accents. The front of the bench seen from the dining side and the shelves on the back wall are made from left-over flooring planks.

Now that the renovation is complete, the living area is a favourite space. "It still delights me. It's so calming. Sitting in the egg chair is a favourite spot," says Angela.

The couple's desire to create a relaxed, warm and welcoming home has worked. Tim splits his work week between the city and home. A trip to visit their grown children is planned, and in the meantime, they'll keep up their regular beach walks with labradoodle Sam.





Half and half

A stunning two-tone kitchen that uses an unexpected visual 'tide line' is the result of one man's passion for his villa renovation.

When Cameron Nimmo of Oamaru was gathering inspiration for the project, he came across a photograph of black character doors and images of dip-painted furniture and doors. Taken with the idea, he decided to use the dado height from elsewhere in the house, which sat at about 1200mm off the floor, and run that line around the kitchen. Everything below would be painted in Resene Foundry and everything above it would be white, with the walls papered in design 46577 from the Resene Wallpaper Collection from Resene ColorShops, and the windows in Resene Quarter Rice Cake. "I used a laser measure to get the line straight, but there was a lot of taping!"

The line runs across window joinery, the pantry door, the fireplace and even a timber dresser. Says Cameron: "People were surprised that I painted the dresser because they thought it was old. But it's actually a new piece made out of recycled teak that I found on TradeMe." The dresser fits snuggly into its purpose-built corner, alongside the newly constructed fireplace which houses a free-standing oven.

The tide line effect is emphasised by the dramatic size of the bench by the window, which is 5m long, while the bifold windows above are 3.4m long. Plans are afoot for a large entertaining deck outside so that

the bench can be accessed on both sides once the windows are open – "like a bar leaner," says Cameron. The benchtop is made of acrylic to avoid unsightly joins and includes a classic butler's sink.

A clever trick has been used on the ceiling in the kitchen – an anaglypta paper embossed to look like old pressed tin ceilings has been applied using design RD0151 from the Resene Wallpaper Anaglypta

Collection, available from Resene ColorShops. It has then been painted in Resene Black White. Cameron chose brass fittings, lights, taps and handles to fit the traditional look of the kitchen and a rich parquet floor... which is actually vinyl. Aside from

Well framed

A stunning feature wall painted in the pale elemental grey of Resene Half Gauntlet is the centrepiece of a kitchen renovation designed by Celia Visser of Visser Design.

The renovation of a 1950s architectural home involved the complete spatial redesign of the existing kitchen and utility area, and the addition of a new scullery. Walls were moved to open up the space, extending the room and incorporating new sliding doors to the deck.

The brief from the homeowner was for a modern kitchen that blended in with the existing architecture and also incorporated rimu – from the floor and window architraves – into the design.

In response, a new wall was built out from the existing outside wall and fitted out with two sets of ovens. Painted in Resene Half Gauntlet, it defines the new wall against a neutral backdrop of Resene Quarter Black White used on the other walls and cabinetry. At the centre of the wall, a rimu-framed alcove was inserted around an existing window and a hob installed to complete the cooking zone.

The search for the right grey took some time but once Resene Half Gauntlet was trialled, Celia and her clients knew instantly it was the right one. Says Celia: "We used the marble benchtop as a colour cue but needed a grey that blended with the ovens but also complemented the rimu frame around the window."

A marble-topped island sits centre stage, with a sink and room for social seating at one end. Rounding off this U-shaped layout is a drinks area – a specific request from the owner – that contains twin, belowbench wine fridges, plus a bar hidden by an electric door with LED lighting.

Avid golf fans, the clients also requested a large TV be incorporated into the back wall that could be viewed from anywhere in the kitchen or family room.

The adjoining scullery was designed as a full preparation area that can be closed off when entertaining. It contains a sink, storage, fridge-freezer and dishwasher, plus an adjacent laundry and utility area.



colour for cosy spaces

Designing a small bathroom is a common challenge. Colour can be your best friend.

Resene Indian Ink



Small bathrooms can be a tricky design hurdle but not an uncommon or unsurmountable one, whether you're in an old character home or a modern apartment. Colour could be the key.

Resene colour expert Carolyn Atkinson says paler tints in shades of blue, aqua or some greens can work well to give the illusion of space. "These are colours that visually recede away from you so they can make spaces appear larger." Try Resene Remember Me, Resene Mystery and Resene Aura from the new Resene The Range fashion colours fandeck.

She also recommends using a large mirror over your vanity. "It will reflect more light around the room as well as creating the illusion of more space."

Windows do much the same job, and should be carefully factored into any bathroom make-over. When designer Laura Lochhead of Pocketspace Interiors (www.pocketspaceinteriors.co.nz) was asked to transform this now stunning yellow and white bathroom in a client's old villa, she started with the window. "Light was an issue so we actually removed the existing window and inserted a horizontal window that framed the line of the bath nicely," Laura says.

This bathroom is also an example of how to use well-planned but bold colours even in small spaces. The striking Resene Turbo yellow on the custom-designed vanity, and its clever lower shelf, came about through the client's love of bright colours. "We kept Resene Turbo refined to the custom vanity and left the custom mirror with a white surround to blend into Resene Black White on the doors and wall. This gave the spotlight to the vanity, highlighting its high-gloss finish."

Laura adds that the floating vanity also breaks up the visual line and adds the impression of extra space.

Designer Kelly Read used strong colours in quite a different way for her bathroom, painted in Resene Olive Green, with complementing charcoal grey fittings and tiles. The challenges of this space didn't end with the size; it has two entry points and is also a laundry.

Kelly wanted the bathroom to feel completely different to the rest of the house, painted almost

entirely in Resene Wan White. Yet she still wanted to make an asset out of its connections to other rooms, emphasising the overlaps and using them to make all the spaces appear larger as a whole.

"It was really just about creating a deep recessive space within a much larger volume. Resene Olive Green accompanied with the dark tiles and lowered ceiling is in complete contrast to the light open nature of the living spaces. Both the hallway and bedroom borrow spatial volume from the basin area, and vice versa. We pushed this overlapping notion further by designing the open basin area to have the look of a dresser or hallway table." **H**

Small bathroom tips

Laura Lochhead:

- Tile choice is key. Bigger tiles make spaces appear bigger.
 Tile orientation can also make a space appear taller or longer.
- Painting gives you the most vivid colour application. For example in this Resene Turbo bathroom a melamine would have looked dull. The high-gloss finish helps bounce light around the space.
- Over-spec storage space in the design. You can always reduce it later.

Kelly Read:

- Consider spatial layering rather than designing rooms in isolation.
- Ensure you have space where you need it, such as around the basin rather than the toilet.

Carolyn Atkinson:

- Use light to mid-toned colour on the floor to open up the space and make it seem larger.
- Think about the ceiling the 'fifth wall' is another place to use bold colours instead of the typical white. It's a good way to avoid the 'refrigerator' look with all-white surfaces.



Meet two quite different homes that have one thing in common – a healthy lifestyle.

n the face of it, these two homes only have one thing in common - they both look great. But beneath those good looks, they are also full of good health, thanks to being awarded a 10 rating under the Homestar initiative.

Homestar is a comprehensive, independent national rating tool that measures the health, warmth and efficiency of houses. The rating scale from one to 10 can be used on any residential project, from standalone houses to multi-units. It is estimated that a high-rating house will cost 10-15 percent more to build, but will save money on maintenance and running costs over its lifetime.

A 6 Homestar rating or higher provides assurance that a house will be better quality – warmer, drier, healthier and cost less to run – than a typical new house built to building code. A 10 Homestar rating means you've built a world-leading house.

Which is exactly what architectural designer Bob Burnett has done with a new house in Christchurch, and Zane Raphael has accomplished for his renovation in Auckland.

Rebuilding right

Located in Christchurch's historic Church Square, in Addington, Bob's design is one of two distinctly different homes replacing an earthquake-damaged cottage, and forms part of a vision for demonstrating more sustainable ideals for enhanced building standards to influence the rebuild of the quake-affected city.

The homes were also the start of The Superhome Movement, a non-profit organisation that catalyses change in the local building industry to raise standards for healthier, more energy-efficient homes.

The north-facing, single-storey home has a classic Cantabrian aesthetic and is designed to allow great sun access for both itself and the dwelling to the south of the site.

Optimum solar gain and quality of light is achieved with no windows on the south side but large openings orientated to the north and east. French doors open





onto a courtyard with an edible garden to the west.

The home has also been designed to be functional and accessible, to the Lifemark standard, ensuring adaptability and ease-of-use.

The Super Reno

In Auckland, when Zane Raphael of Renovation Builders bought a rundown 1967 home, he had no idea he was about to embark on what's now been dubbed 'The Super Reno' – the nation's first 10 Homestar Renovation.

Zane and wife Suzanne engaged Allan McIntosh of Buildology Architectural Design to create a dream home for his family, providing design services and a Homestar assessment.

The walls of the original house had no insulation and were damp and gap ridden, preventing heat retention. Original 1960s timber joinery sufficed in summer, but under-performed in wet and windy winter.

The house now has good insulation, an HRV system, photovoltaic panels on the roof to harness solar energy and a 26 cubic metre underground tank to store roof-surface rainwater. It also has the highest Lifemark rating with features such as level thresholds, wheelchair access, good door widths, accessible taps, switch heights, power point placements and grip bars in the bathrooms.

you will need:

- One sheet of IBS V-Groove 9mm-thick plywood cut into: 2 pieces at 1150mm x 550mm for the front and back; 1 piece at 1200mm x 600mm for the lid; 2 x 550mm (h) x 535mm (w) making sure the lines go across the width for the ends.
- Either a second sheet of grooved ply or use plain plywood: 1 piece at 1125mm x 535mm for the base. (Note that using 9mm grooved plywood rather than planks makes the storage box lighter and easier to move.)
- Five 2.4m lengths of 45mm x 19mm timber for the frame cut into: 4 x 1150mm for the top and bottom, front and back; 4 x 497mm for verticals at the ends and 4 x 445mm for horizontals at

- the ends. Cut 2 x 575mm for the side of the lid, and one at 1200mm long for the front of the lid.
- 1m length of H3 treated 19mm x 90mm:
 2 x 500mm for the feet. These are the only pieces that will touch any damp ground.
- 1 litre of Resene Quick Dry primer undercoat
- 1 litre of Resene Lumbersider tinted to your chosen colour. We used Resene Poured Milk.
- 1 paint brush
- Sandpaper and filler
- Drop saw or skill saw
- Screws, power drill, screwdriver
- 2 hinges
- 300mm of chain and two anchor screws

Step 1: Make the frame, starting with the top pieces laid on a flat surface to make sure all pieces are square and even. Make the base frame, then attach to the top frame with the vertical side pieces.

Step 2: Attach the end pieces of plywood (measuring 550mm x 535mm) first as these sit flush with the frame at the top and side edges. BUT leave a 15mm overhang or lip at the bottom. This is to allow for the base and the feet to be inset. Attach the front and back, lining them up with the ends, with the 15mm overlap at the bottom.

Step 3: Attach the feet to the base piece of ply, on the smooth side not the grooved side if you are using grooved ply, then drop the base piece into place. Screw into place.

Step 4: Make the frame for the lid; there's no back piece, just sides and front. Attach the piece of ply for the lid. Glue the hinges to the lid or use short screws (longer screws will poke through the ply). Fill the screw holes in the frame, and sand back when dry. Also check for sharp edges or any rough patches that might need a light sand.

Step 5: Undercoat the storage box using Resene Quick Dry primer undercoat.

Step 6: Apply two topcoats of Resene Lumbersider low sheen tinted to your chosen colour. We used Resene Poured Milk. You can also use Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss for a more wipeable finish. Attach the chain to the lid and inner side of the box to stop the lid from flipping back too far.



A clever colour-block approach brightens this garden.

o often, house exteriors are painted in a restrained palette of tonal neutrals. Simple. And maybe a little bit plain.

That approach wasn't going to cut it for Helen and lan Ivess. Sure, they chose some smoky dark greys for their home in the seaside settlement of Oakura, south of New Plymouth. But then came a wall of soft mother-of-pearl white, and three walls of... well, red.

The couple opted for exterior blocks of colour after being inspired by the same technique on a local hotel. Resene Seashell was applied to the northwest facing walls overlooking a neighbouring park while the front of the house received a covering of dark green-grey Resene Woodsmoke. Resene Burnt Crimson went on three of the garage walls and on another wing of the house. The base of the house and fences are in Resene Black and the deck is Resene Stack.

feature garden



The Ivess property is blessed with no physical boundary with neighbouring Matekai Park. First there were cows in the park. Then grazing sheep that occasionally got stuck in fences. Over time the fences came out and the park now visually blends with Helen and lan's garden.

Like others in the neighbourhood who border this communal space, the couple has enhanced it by planting trees and erecting a birdbath popular with tui and kereru. Helen tells stories of her parents moving here in 1952. Her father helped fashion the street, which runs parallel to the beach, with a bulldozer. "We were just country bumpkins then."

The couple's house began as a bach-like structure but after several additions and coats of paint, it feels modern, airy and colourful. "I love painting," declares Helen, who is a home economics and textiles teacher, Resene Seashell



as well as an events contractor for the Taranaki Arts Festival Trust. "We have had different colours over the years – colours that were fashionable in the 80s as well as what lan calls 'Oakura grey', a shade of beige."


"What I wanted with the Resene Woodsmoke was the colour of oil and that's the closest I could find... It was the sheen and shades you saw in different lights. I wanted something like that which was dark but not black." The exterior tones are bright yet timeless, with the garden and trees enhancing this aesthetic.

Helen enlisted the help of a landscape designer friend to draw up a garden plan, which then evolved. "I don't think that I'm a particularly avid gardener to be perfectly honest, but I like everything nice and tidy."

She and Ian clearly possess some skill, however, because the garden is structured with something to see from every angle. A collection of bangalow palms is striking as you enter the property – their stout trunks resemble columns, providing drama and vertical interest. At their base is a mat of Chinese star jasmine, while a well-established aloe vera plant and another unusual specimen with a red pineapple-type flower, break up the groupings of green foliage.

Around the corner, the park houses a range of productive trees including macadamia, bay and avocado. A tall clipped hedge of the scented shrub michelia frames the front door, which is painted in Resene Pohutukawa. Helen's favourite colour is red but she is cautious of over-using it, satisfying herself with its vibrant sheen on the exterior and interior doors.

At ground level there is a combination of the glossy leaves of Ligularia reniformis, a reddy-coloured ground cover and a cycad palm. Together they edge a



pottery urn. Stripes of mondo grass pop up between grey pavers that create a path across the grass.

Red and yellow hibiscus are planted at the base of the deck. Ponytail palms are among the trees adding height to this area.

A west-facing low garden is home to veggies and herbs; in a much higher garden bed, vegetation spills over the edges. Here, alstromeria and rosemary are given free rein.

Steps lead back to the deck where the striking leaves of a cycad and three bird of paradise plants make a show in a sheltered spot.

The theme of bold foliage and colour continues around the other sides of the house.

In one corner, the branches of both a kowhai tree and feijoa arch over a buddha statue, brought back from Bali. At its feet, clumps of grass-like Liriope muscari enclose the ground.

Down the side of the house, arching fronds of nikau palms add structure, along with staghorn ferns. Thick healthy clivia boast a range of yellow and apricot flowers. Other shade-loving plants such as hellebores spread across the ground.

It is a harmonious and layered garden. The boldness and organisation of the planting complements the strong exterior colours. Combine that with endless birdsong and the knowledge that you're not far from the ocean, and a sunny, holiday feeling pervades this Oakura home and garden. H

paint it right


