





add a splash of paint colour to walls for a completely new look.

Colours are evolving more slowly and colour trends are lasting longer, with a slow waxing and waning of favourites. There is a dichotomy between those seeking cheerful environments with optimistic brights and those wanting to play it safe with dark hues and neutrals.

Neutrals, browns and beiges tend towards warmer comforting variants, such as Resene Secret Road and Resene Fantail. There is a slow move from the grey family to browns, warm neutrals and mineral-inspired hues, including subtle flesh tones such as Resene Half Rickshaw. Off-whites are pure and uncomplicated, and there is a definite comeback of cool white, such as Resene Barely There, as a background neutral.

Pink diverges into many hues from soft to luscious, such as Resene Smitten and Resene Devoted, to suit a wider range of projects. Blues are also growing in number, with intense blues, such as Resene Magnum and Resene Nite Life, a viable neutral alternative to grey or black. Combine the simplicity of blue and silver, such as Resene Silver Streak, for a luxurious modern look, H





# to be so bold

# feature house

hris Bracegirdle and Lindsay Robinson's self-assured Christchurch house is a great example of how best to live.

Its fabulousness is the result of acting with urgency, then employing a certain gutsy restraint. Keep reading and you'll realise there's no oxymoron here. The home is also a result of trusting the expertise and design skill of talented professionals.

The couple may never have driven this way across the Christchurch hills just over a decade ago, had they not swerved from Chris' plans for the day. Still resident in Nelson, Chris was on a weekend visit south. Suffering a cold, she cancelled an arrangement and instead drove slowly past a home listed for sale, on the apex of three roads. The house in question was fairly pedestrian – a weatherboard bungalow split in two.


One hugely redeeming feature, however, was its wide sea views. Not hesitating, Lindsay phoned architect and friend lan Cumberpatch, who "drove straight over," spied the view from the roof and wholeheartedly endorsed the plan to purchase. By deciding so spontaneously, Chris and Lindsay neatly nipped in front of a growing line-up of potential buyers. It's something they've not regretted.

The living area is a sophisticated space with a spark of fun thanks to colourful furnishings. Resene Masala is on the back wall, the ceiling is Resene Merino, the kitchen Resene Pacifika and Resene Aluminium.

"In a matter of weeks Ian had the sketch done and those original specifications form exactly what stands here today," Chris says.

Both Ian and design-savvy master builder Lindsay could see it was both simple and ideal to build up on the home's existing footprint. This would maximise views, sunshine and light while simultaneously "tucking the home privately into its site".

Although the house sits on a compact 595 square metres of land, it seems generous and expansive. A barrel-vaulted ceiling along with reflective yet non-glaring surfaces result in a feeling of additional space.

Another early collaborator on this home was architectural and interior designer Wendy Campbell, who often works with Ian Cumberpatch on both residential and commercial projects. She believes the home benefits greatly from having been professionally conceived right from the decision to transform and build upwards.

Wendy would call this interior "crisp yet warm, and a little bit funky". A member of Architectural Designers New Zealand (ADNZ), she is often involved right from the start on budget, layout and all specifications. Later on she commissions bespoke soft furnishings and often sources artwork for clients. Her involvement is often ongoing; recently, for example, Chris asked Wendy to refresh several interior colours and fabrics, and to co-design (with Ian) some additional bespoke furniture.

When Lindsay and Chris bought here, Chris was at a point in life ideal for jettisoning some worn-out furnishings and starting again. While neither Lindsay nor Chris wanted stark, minimal surroundings, both have nevertheless been exceedingly selective about what to include in terms of furnishings, fabrics and artwork.

"We knew we needed some gorgeous rich colour. We also wanted easy, visible access to >

our books," Chris says. By involving Wendy and Ian they've managed to have both without sacrificing any modernity of style.

"Wendy pushed the colour envelope far further than I would have," Chris admits. "If I'd decorated this without her I would have dabbled in safer shades and I know I wouldn't have been so wholehearted about the result. The greatest risk for me personally was with Wendy's choice of Resene Tia Maria, the deep orange of the stairwell wall. But I love it now! As soon as the stairs went in, its loudness was offset by pale matt aluminium and seemed absolutely great," Chris says. Outside, the colour is repeated as a key landscaping feature, its cheekiness enhanced by bold verticals and unapologetically spiky plants.

Other bold choices include the deep mossy Resene Pacifika green of the kitchen joinery, the purpley Resene Zibibbo of the front door, and the uncompromising strength of Resene Rhino behind the bed in the master bedroom.

Creatively speaking, things are still evolving. At one stage the guest bedroom had a feature wall of Resene Cab Sav, but that's now replaced by Resene Merino. And the kitchen back wall has just been sprayed with a Resene metallic paint (Resene Aluminium) so that the cook enjoys a sparkly reflected estuary view.

Chris and Lindsay, together with Wendy and Ian, share an understanding that the right site, together with ideal design, materials and colours never fail to lift the experience of daily living to another plane. And if this St Andrews Hill home is an indication, it's an immensely enjoyable, deeply satisfying one. H



n summer, it's not unusual to spot teams of school children with paintbrushes in hand, carefully adding bold flourishes to large murals that enliven fences and walls in public places around Manukau City. Sometimes you see groups tending gardens, even cleaning up footpaths and streets. It's all part of an initiative by the Manukau City Council to inspire pride in the community.

About 10 years ago, the then-mayor of Manukau City, Barry Curtis, established Manukau Beautiful to provide and promote projects that enhance the visual beauty of New Zealand's biggest city. In 2001, the project became the Manukau Beautification Charitable Trust, supported by Manukau City Council and companies like Resene. As well as offering an affordable rate for its anti-graffiti products, Resene donates recycled paint through the Resene PaintWise programme to cover graffiti and for use on

murals and public spaces to deter graffiti.

The trust's operations manager, Barbara Carney, explains that the projects undertaken include graffiti removal, painting murals, education and garden competitions. "But, by default, by far the most time is focused around graffiti eradication." A graffiti removal team has seven vans that travel throughout the area every day, removing graffiti from beside main arterial routes, on fences and council property.

The trust helps commercial property owners by planting trees and shrubs next to 'high risk walls' – a proven deterrent to tagging and vandalism. It also gives property owners advice on protective coatings and other tagging preventative measures. To monitor the success of the project, the trust keeps tabs on the number of tags they've dealt to; the area of tags in square metres and the litres of paint

used to cover up graffiti (see box).

Staff also spend time educating young children, working closely with primary and intermediate schools in Manukau. "For that age group," says Barbara, "education is focused on prevention. Once children are at high school, it's almost too late."

There are also Manukau School's Fun and Activity Days held at the Auckland Botanic Gardens where children take part in a variety of hands-on activities including planting pot plants, making scarecrows and painting colourful mural tiles with images of flora and fauna.

The school programme aims to encourage pride, respect and responsibility in the students towards their environment. Barbara takes a police officer with her to schools to discuss the legal implications of tagging. "We usually take the children to

Groups such as the Manukau Beautification Trust keep their costs down by benefitting from Resene's paint recycling scheme, and your unwanted paint.

a local reserve or walkway to paint out the graffiti. We talk about taking ownership of their community and taking pride in what they've done. I try to encourage discussion by asking 'what does the mural artist have that the graffiti artist doesn't?' – it's permission."

The typical tagger, she explains, repeats their scrawl as many times as possible to gain recognition and status from other taggers. If graffiti is removed quickly, taggers are denied their glory. Graffiti vandalism is a community problem that encourages more vandalism and other types of crime, she says. "We need to send clear messages to those involved in tagging that we won't tolerate it."

Only time will tell if the education measures will make a difference in Manukau, says Barbara. Statistics show that there has been a decrease in graffiti, but it won't be

known for a long time just how successful the programmes have been. "A handful of taggers keep on at it and unfortunately some children look up to them. But I can see a difference, so I think we're having an impact. But with the technology and TV promoting tagging, I don't think it will ever disappear."

The trust also runs the hugely popular Manukau in Bloom Garden Awards each year in which hundreds of homeowners receive vouchers from Resene and Mitre 10 as prizes, prompting them to further invest in their property to make Manukau beautiful. H

# what's your colour psyche?

Have you ever felt drawn to some colours and repelled by others? Perhaps it's your colour personality!

o you love being enveloped in warm, earthy tones? Or are soft pastels more your taste? Have you ever felt uncomfortable with the colours in a room but didn't know why?

As stylist Angela Stone of Styleyou says: "People gravitate towards colours that inspire and suit them, so nine times out of 10, they will choose colours out of sheer intuition for their homes." For years she has used seasonal colour theory to help people determine what clothes to buy, and now your house decor can be matched to your personality season, too.

Resene Wellington colour consultant Carolyn Atkinson has seen the theory in practice many times. "Often people will keep a scrapbook of images and magazine clippings they like but not know why. I might point out, for example, that all the images contain timber. It's often a surprise to people what the underlying attraction has been."

She has observed that in the southern hemisphere, summer and autumn palettes are more common, influenced strongly by nature and organic elements like timber, stone, sand, mountains, forests. These are very autumnal elements whereas summer is influenced by exotic colours and Asian-Pacific tones.

Using the seasonal theory is a good way to avoid decorating mistakes. "Some people feel pressured to simply follow the fashion trends. If someone tells me they want to use the latest colour on their walls, I ask them if that's because they like it or think they should," says Carolyn.

No-one is purely one colour personality but focusing on your dominant one will help you put together interior schemes that feel right. Even introducing a few elements of your colour personality can make a room feel instantly welcoming.



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# Seest up your wallpaper

Wallpaper is back in the spotlight for its new textures, modern colours, and both subtle and statement designs. And for its re-discovered practicality: much like a cosmetic concealer, it can hide less than perfect walls, and is quick to apply. One 'coat' of wallpaper is all you need, and with new technology, it is now much easier to remove when you want to redecorate.

### WALLPAPERING IS EASIER THAN YOU THINK

**Equipment** What tools you need will depend on the type of paper you've chosen.

Basic equipment includes: a paint roller or brushes, scissors and a knife with a sharp blade, sponges, a ruler, a smoothing brush, sealer and size for the wall (depending on the wall surface) the recommended adhesive, a plumb line, a ladder, a bucket, a water trough and a drop cloth or plastic sheet.

**Surface preparation** This is **the MOST important** part of hanging any wallpaper. The surface must be clean, dry and sound, and well-sized, so that the wallpaper is easy to position and sticks properly. Different walls need different preparations, so ask your retailer for their advice and read the manufacturer's instructions.

Work out how you will hang the wallpaper before you begin Decide where your seams will be placed before you start to avoid wastage, especially if you have a patterned or drop-match wallpaper. Start in a corner and work away from the main source of natural light. If you are using patterned wallpaper on a statement wall, start in the middle of the wall. Try to avoid having a seam fall less than 5cm from doors, windows or corners.

**Make a plumb line** Always hang your first strip of paper next to a plumb line, so that even if your ceilings or floors are not level, the wallpaper will be straight.

**Cut your paper** Cut each strip of wallpaper to the correct length, but leave room at the top and bottom to overlap the ceiling coving and skirting boards, and for a pattern match if needed.

Pre-pasted paper Correct soaking is vital. Fill a water trough with lukewarm water, and place it against the skirting. Loosely re-roll the length of wallpaper from the bottom edge with the pattern or texture on the inside. Place in the water, making sure it is fully covered and leave it to soak for the recommended time: usually a brief 5 seconds. Then, draw the paper from the top end out of the trough and lie the wet paper paste-side up, on a plastic sheet. Fold the paper, from the bottom up, one-third of the length, and then the top down to overlap this fold by 10mm. Pull several lengths through the water trough and fold as described. Drain and leave these folded lengths for a further 8-10 minutes. This allows the paper – and you – to relax, before you work it into its final position.

**Paste-the-wall paper** The latest development in wallcoverings, Paste-the-wall products have a specially developed backing which allows it to be hung dry, straight from the roll. You 'paint' the paste (Metylan Special) onto the wall. This can cut the decorating time by about a half and is great for beginners.

Paste one section of the wall at a time – just wider than about 2 drops - so that the paste doesn't dry out. Slide the paper into place and check the match then trim off to fit at the bottom edge.

Now stand back and admire the finished result...

The inaugural Resene Total Colour Awards drew striking entries from a patchwork-style exterior to a restful Kapiti home and Mondrian-inspired kitchen.







As the judges commented: "Colour is not applied to this house, it is integral. This project is different and innovative, and nicely balanced, bringing elements of excitement, stimulation and surprise... with a clever use of the combination of neutrals and delightful pink. The theme of the stripes and vertical elements is intriguing."

also needed to be presentable when viewed from above as the driveway descends on the house above the roof-line."

# taking notice

Use three clever Resene products to create this handy family noticeboard.




ith a tall noticeboard attached to the wall using three Resene specialty paints, the kids can use the blackboard and magnetic board at the bottom, you can all use the magnetic board in the middle and only taller people can use the whiteboard at the top.



#### You will need:

- Sheet of mdf enough to cut a 600mm x 1500mm panel
- 4.5m of frame mouldings. We used 30mm wide but you could use a wider frame
- 1.2m of 20mm x 5mm beading
- 500ml Resene Quick Dry primer
- 500ml Resene Half Alabaster and Resene Pursuit, or whatever colour suits your decor (we used Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss waterborne enamel)
- Resene Blackboard Paint, Resene Magnetic Magic; and Resene Write-on Wall Paint
- 38mm paint brush
- Small roller with No.2 and No.4 sleeves
- Masking tape and glue
- Panel pins, glazier's push pins and wall screws (angle brackets optional)

- Resene First Light




#### Step 1

Cut board to size – we used a 1500mm x 600mm panel. Seal both sides with Resene Quick Dry. Mark panel into three even sections and apply masking tape. Paint the top third in Resene Half Alabaster, then the bottom two-thirds in Resene Magnetic Magic. Apply topcoats: the top third in Resene Write-on Wall Paint; the middle third with Resene Pursuit; the bottom third in Resene Blackboard Paint. Remove masking tape before the paint dries.

#### Step 2

Cut the frame to size with mitred corners. Cut the beading to length. Paint the lengths with Resene Quick Dry then one coat of Resene Half Alabaster. Position the lengths against the finished panel and secure with panel pins.




#### Step 3

Use glazier's push pins to secure the panel to the frame from behind. If using a wider frame, angle brackets will give more security.


### Step 4

Glue the beading to the front of the panel to define the three sections. Give the beading and the frame a final coat of paint. Screw directly to your wall.

# covered for the good life



iving on a lifestyle block provides a way of life reminiscent of the good life, with open spaces, self sufficiency and a level of freedom not often found in the city. So, when considering a move to a country property, lifestyle block or other large residential section, it's important to review your insurance cover so you can be sure your freedom and lifestyle is protected.

### What kind of cover would you typically need on a lifestyle block?

It's important to discuss your individual needs with your insurer. At a minimum, however, you may need to consider taking out the following:

- House insurance which covers the house itself and a garage.
- Contents insurance, which covers internal contents as well as gardening equipment.
   Contents insurance may also cover liability for damage caused by domestic animals like a dog, cat or horse.
- Additional 'lifestyle block' cover may be needed if the property has other animals, barns or outbuildings, or special machinery.

Keeping all your insurance with the same insurer can also result in savings. For example, adding a lifestyle block policy to your home and contents policies can provide a greater discount on all three policies.

### What is the difference between a large residential section and a lifestyle block?

Depending on your insurer, the size of the section may or may not determine the difference, however additional features such as animals, machinery, barns or shelterbelts could make a difference to the cover that is needed.

It's important to tell your insurer you live on a lifestyle block or country property, as the size of the property may not be asked when setting up a house policy. Your insurer may have no way of knowing how big your section is or what additional features you may need separate cover for.

### If I don't own a large farm do I have to pay for the same level of cover?

AMI has a 'pick n mix' style of lifestyle block policy so you only choose the cover options that are relevant for your lifestyle block. You only pay for what is relevant.

### What kinds of animals are covered for accidental damage to property?

Lifestyle blocks often contain animals (whether pets or livestock) so it is important to ensure you have appropriate cover for either the animals themselves, or any damage that an animal may cause to your own or other people's property.

While domestic pets such as cats and dogs and in some cases horses, may be included in liability cover in a contents policy, sheep, cows or the family goat will need a separate cover (for example) if they accidentally wander onto the road and cause an accident or damage to other people's property.

### Am I covered for accidental damage caused by people visiting or working on my lifestyle block?

People you have invited on to your property, such as friends, family or workers are usually covered for any accidental damage they may cause to your property, however they are usually excluded from coverage for acts such as deliberate damage or theft. The security of your home is important to consider if people are coming and going during the course of a day, so ensure valuables are kept out of sight or in a secure location.

### I live in a high fire risk area – what cover is provided for me?

Rural sections may be covered by the Forest and Rural Fires Act 1977. This means (amongst other things) that if a fire starts in a neighbour's property, the owners of surrounding properties may be called on to contribute to the cost of putting the fire out, even if they had no involvement in it starting. Your lifestyle block insurance may provide liability cover so your insurance company will pay your contribution.

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

raig St George found his perfect home in the unlikely guise of old butcher's shop. The long walls and three-metre high ceilings were little more than a dark concrete box at first, but once he hired New Plymouth architect Ian Pritchard, between them they wrestled out an award-winning design of clean modern lines and light.

Built in the 1930s as a butcher's shop (complete with sloping floor to hose down muck and blood), the challenges for the 120 square metre space were "...a lot!" Craig smiles at the memory. "First there was fitting in what I wanted and the number of rooms in this long rectangular building. And of course, light! It was pitch black. It was basically a dark tunnel."

Although the design brief was initially 'industrial grunge', lan saw an opportunity to do something timeless yet in keeping with Craig's modern utilitarian theme. Within three short months the place was completely gutted and finished. "It's a new slick apartment slipped into an old concrete coat," says lan. "Existing rough concrete walls contrast with the new work, each enhancing the other."


A panel of bright orange (Resene Mexican Wave) now marks the entrance and welcomes Craig and his wife Wu Li home. "We wanted something with punch," explains Craig. The main entrance has become a wall of glass so that natural light now streams into the kitchen, dining and living room. Bringing the outside theme inside, the burst of orange continues as a glossy glass splashback in the kitchen. It adds brilliant contrast to the simple colour scheme within, but also helps define the kitchen area.

Here a raised white ceiling (Resene White) adds to the feeling of limitless space. As do exposed wooden beams also painted white, blending and lending themselves to an airy loft-like appearance. Walls are white throughout (also Resene White) while stainless steel bench tops and aluminium skirting add silver highlights.

Simple yet stunning in design is a small open-air courtyard dividing the apartment into living and sleeping areas. Unadorned save for a few plants, it brings light and a quiet serenity right into the heart of the apartment. Glass sliding doors open from the living room, the centrally located master bedroom, and along one side of the connecting hall. Entirely internal, its doors can be left open on a hot summer's night without compromising security.

Reflective surfaces also create a sense of space and light. The hallway hides the laundry and a 10-metre long storage system behind a wall of metal roller doors. Polished pebble and concrete floors add shine and texture to hardwearing practicality, while

handle-less lacquered white cabinetry gives a streamlined look.

It is no surprise that Craig is a devout minimalist. He loves to be clear of clutter. In the bathroom, as throughout, floating cabinetry give a sense of extra floor space and weightlessness. The apartment's ambient lighting is hidden strip, with not one intrusive bulb to be seen.

Another delight is the design of the two smaller 'windowless' bedrooms. White walls bounce light from the unusual clerestorystyle ceilings. The rooms' common wall extends above the roof and unseen louver windows allow in a soft indirect light and connection to the outside world.

Like the rest of the home these rooms are fresh and light. Zen-like in its simplicity, whiteness and precise use of colour, this home is now far removed from its dark beginnings. H





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

### a colourful twist for the St George living area




Alex Fulton, interior designer, suggests this alternative scheme:

This scheme injects colour and a sense of fun to a very open and light space. The usual approach would be to make the walls white then add colour through accessories but why not reverse that and highlight with white while having the large objects such as the couch and walls in blocks of colour? The coffee table, lamp and shelving unit are white to match the ceiling and trim (Resene Half Alabaster) and to contrast with the bold block colours. I see this room as a place for family board games, entertaining friends, or reading a magazine by yourself. The colour scheme originates from the bold wallpaper. The open shelves let you see the strong wall colour (Resene Retreat). You could then have brightly coloured objects on the shelves. Replacing the television with this unusual suspended fireplace adds cosiness and ambience.

### Shelley Cooper and Rae Zhao, of Zoop Design, suggest this alternative scheme:

This long, narrow angular space is softened by using curved organic shapes that are inspired by nature. The sofa is welcoming and comfortable and reflects the trend towards rounded shapes for sofas and chairs. The rug also features curved shapes and introduces warmth and texture to the space. The rattan ottoman and outdoor chair mirror the materials used in the pendant lighting, bringing a feeling of unity to the design. A sense of indoor/outdoor flow is heightened by using the same shape of chair as the sofa, but in different materials. The colour palette is warm and dramatic featuring Resene Pursuit, a vibrant red, and Resene Half Alabaster which works well with warm tones.

# into the light

Fantasy and reality, dark and light all weave through the lustrous artworks of this Palmerston North artist.

t's an art form used centuries ago on icons and sacral paintings, but artist Philip Liggins uses the technique of reverse painting on glass to great effect today.

"Everything is the opposite to traditional painting on canvas. The signature, details and foreground work, such as trees or birds flying, are painted first. And when they're dry, I paint the next layer, like the sky, over the dry foreground work. The art is done in layers, from the signature and foreground first, to the background last."

Philip's finished work is viewed from the front, unpainted side. The glass "serves as a support and a protective surface – almost like a varnish." The result is a bright, clear colour since the paint is not absorbed as it would be if applied to canvas, wood or paper. The combination of paint and glass produces an intensity of colour and luminous quality that you don't see in other mediums. Choosing the colours used is therefore very important, says Philip.

Philip chose the art form not long after completing a Certificate in Foundation Visual Arts in 1991, at UCOL (formerly Manawatu Polytechnic). It was winning a local Resene Art Contest run in Palmerston North in 2008, however, that inspired him to continue painting. His winning painting of an adult penguin with its young offspring has a strong ecology theme and is painted in various shades of blue – Philip's favourite colour!

Philip has used Resene paint, usually the small testpots, "ever since I

started painting" because of its durability, low odour and 'stickability'." He also likes the huge range of colours. He currently has 300 pots of colour "on the go".

An affinity for wildlife and a quirky use of unusual materials are strong components of Philip's work – for example, the heavily textured painting of an armadillo, which curves around the spiked teeth of a circular saw blade. It took around two weeks to complete.

His paintings of exotic jungle animals, dogs and horses have a naïve, refreshing simplicity, with a strong use of pattern, much like the work of French Post-Impressionist painter, Henri Rousseau, (1844-1910). These contrast strongly with the theatrical, fantasy figures of his other work. "I particularly like the work of UK-based fantasy artist, Chris Achilleos, who creates artwork for the *Fighting Fantasy* game-book series."

Philip is currently working on a commissioned painting, but his next artworks will "feature different forms of marine life, such as octopus and shark, with the circular saw blade as a base material."

Philip's artwork can be found at markets in the Manawatu and Horowhenua regions, at Mama Maternity, an arts and crafts retail outlet to be opened shortly in Feilding, Manawatu, or he can be contacted on 021 154 9606. **H**

### beaded lampshade

Make the pretty lampshade from our winning room.

#### You will need:

- Wooden craft beads with good-size holes you can pass a wool needle through
- Wool needle
- Assorted ribbon
- Resene testpots in colours that suit your room – we used Resene Pink Panther, Resene Princess, Resene Kermit and Resene Half Alabaster
- Hot glue gun and glue (get adults to help)
- Wire and wire frame or inside of a lampshade (you could recycle an old one)

#### To make:


- Paint wooden beads in assorted coloured paint then set aside to dry (thread the beads onto a pipe cleaner to paint them for clean hands). Prepare the lampshade frame. You may need to add wire supports as shown.
- 2. Thread the first ribbon through the wool needle and start threading on beads in random size and colour order. You can adjust the spacing later.
- 3. Tie the ribbon end to the frame, then push a larger bead over to hide the knot and loose end. Start weaving the ribbon in and out of the frame by going under then over both the top and bottom of the

frame. Space the beads as you go.

- 4. At the top and bottom of the frame glue the ribbon onto itself, making sure the ribbon is taut but not so tight as to bend the frame. It should also hide the frame. Keep threading and weaving.
- 5. Change ribbon colour by simply tying together then push a bead over the join.
- 6. You might want to use some painted beads as legs on the bottom. Glue them on with the hot glue gun. Make sure you use a low wattage energy-saving bulb.

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
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# all that glitters...



This jewel of a house is a reflection of its owners' love of colour.

rtist and colour consultant Angela Pietkiewicz Williams is certainly not afraid to make a bold statement. The property she and husband Shayne Williams recently sold in Eastbourne, Wellington, is resplendent in deep and dramatic hues. It opposes any idea that only pale colours should be used in smaller rooms, and that, in order to sell a property, the decor should remain 'safe'.

With not a neutral wall in sight, the couple had no trouble attracting buyers and Ange puts this down to the balance of colour being exactly right. "As soon as I walk into a room," she says, "I can tell if that balance is out and what needs to be done to correct it - it's usually something simple but can make a huge difference."

The couple had asked Robyn de la Haye, from Essence Architectural Design, to design changes that allowed the house to be opened up and have better connection to the outdoors. The lounge had no windows other than at the single door leading to the deck, and a galley kitchen and separate dining room meant there was no natural congregation point for guests as they arrived. Says Ange: "The place lacked a heart and Robyn worked with our vision to create one."

The collaboration between architectural designer (Robyn is a member of the ADNZ) and client was clearly a successful one. Without changing the footprint, Robyn transformed the internal spaces, replacing bedroom windows with ranch sliders onto a new deck and opening up the separate kitchen, dining and living rooms into one >



glorious, welcoming space. The kitchen was moved to take advantage of the views across Wellington harbour, with stairs added for internal access to the studio and pool room downstairs. Once the building work was complete, Ange set about embellishing the property with colour.

The original cream weatherboard exterior was covered with Resene Diesel, to give the house depth and allow it to blend visually into the bush-clad hill it nestles against.

The same respect for the property's surroundings is apparent throughout the interior, too. On the upper level, the open plan kitchen, living and dining area is painted in Resene Awol. The green theme is continued in the master bedroom, but with the darker Resene Green Leaf chosen for its more restful appearance.

The downstairs games room reflects the colour of the outdoor swimming pool, with the walls and ceiling all in Resene Lochmara. The ceiling was originally white but was always stained with the dust of blue chalk used for the pool cues. Says Ange: "Guests love it, likening it to an exclusive, intimate cocktail bar."

Ange says opening up rooms to the new deck and the strategic use of colour gives the house an outward-looking yet welcoming feel. By day, the property sits gently in its setting. By night, with its expansive use of glass, dramatic colour and clever lighting, it becomes a jewel set within Eastbourne's dramatic landscape. H

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### like a fine wine

Rich red cabinets and a strikingly lit island bench make this a sophisticated and elegant kitchen.

n a major renovation that opened up a Wellington house to its stunning harbour views, this dramatic red kitchen is an eyecatching centrepiece.

Designed by Pauline Stockwell, the kitchen was transformed from its small pokey space to be part of the large open-plan living area.

The homeowners love the colour red so Pauline chose Resene Pohutukawa to be used not as a lacquer on the cabinetry, but back-painted onto toughened glass. This gives the kitchen a wonderful luminosity and is further enhanced by the striking treatment used for the front of the island bench. Here, Kings Fourth Generation timber specialists pieced together strips of timber and acrylic resin in a product called Laser Grain to form a panel. This is then backlit with red LED lights for a dramatic neon-style effect. Black enamel pendant lights with a quirky red flex from ECC run the length of the island bench for task lighting.

Says Pauline: "Opening up the existing kitchen and incorporating the hallway left a long, narrow space – the perfect setting for a large 4m x 1m island."

The island extends into a lower table, in wenge timber, to provide not only a casual eating area but a place for children to do their homework. Wenge is also used on the full-height cabinetry at the end of the kitchen which includes an appliance cupboard and pantry, and to frame the ends

of the long island bench. The rich, deep tones of the timber echoes the owners' collection of retro black leather furniture.

The walls in the area were painted Resene Half Tea for a calming, neutral background to the otherwise bold colours.

The island bench acts as a central point when the owners entertain – it has a wine cabinet underneath and a second, smaller sink with a tap that delivers chilled and boiling water. Double ovens were also included in the kitchen design.

A combination of benchtop materials is used, with an engineered stone on the island bench, and a textured stainless steel used around the cooking hob and main sink. The recessed handles on the cabinetry are a fuss-free solution while the coloured cork tile floors pick up on the deep tones of the timber cabinetry.

"Overall, the kitchen renovation has made the space lighter and more modern, and allowed occupants of the kitchen to appreciate the views," says Pauline. "We even realigned the height of the windows in the living area to sit level with the benchtops in the new kitchen." H

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# all white's not alright

Quirky tiles and turquoise paint make this bathroom special.

tip-off from her sister was the starting point for Tracy Towers' bathroom with its distinctive tiled feature wall and colourful vanity unit, painted Resene Hullabaloo.

When Tracy and her family moved into the 1970s suburban home, the configuration of the bathroom was typical of the era – three smaller rooms with the shower and toilet separated out from the main bathroom. The shower room was "so disgusting we only used it once or twice before we renovated".

And her sister's tip-off? To check out the range of quirky and colourful tiles available at Middle Earth Tiles. Says Tracy: "I was originally thinking about green tiles but then saw this blue one and loved it."

While the toilet has been kept in a separate room, the shower room has been incorporated into the main bathroom, allowing for a large tiled shower area that's perfect for a family of teenagers. A half-height tiled wall separates it from the vanity, with glass above to allow the feature wall to be seen uninterrupted.

The Middle Earth tiles extend over the entire end wall of the bathroom, including into the shower, with a listello strip running through the remaining white tile walls for continuity.

Tracy had commissioned designer Joanne Godding of Bespoke on Khyber to help with her previous house so called her in again for the bathroom project.

Says Joanne: "It's great working with such a design aware client and one who isn't afraid of using colour. She knows what she wants and isn't afraid of following through with that."

Although Tracy had a clear idea of what she wanted, and the layout was restricted to the original positioning of the vanity and bath, Joanne was charged with designing the vanity unit to unite the visual elements. Says Joanne: "We kept it relatively simple so that it didn't overtake the tiles visually."

A matai timber vanity top from Kings Fourth Generation (a surprisingly robust surface) and open shelves bring warmth to the room, while



the Resene Hullabaloo panelled drawers echo the tile colour. The square top-mounted basin means that drawer space isn't lost, and makes the area easier to clean, says Tracy.

Tracy was keen on the open shelves in order to store towels; she has also introduced colour into the otherwise white room with ceramic wall art.

To complete the picture, she used a whimsical paua and mirror mosaic mirror from Art of Gifts in Birkenhead, Auckland, set between two light sconces from ECC. "I didn't want a big mirror to cover the tiles. This doesn't detract from the tiles, and works in well with them."

The next area for a makeover was the adjacent toilet, which Tracy had painted white. "The painters left at the end of the day and I thought 'yuck'. It was too white - white walls, white toilet, white basin, white tiles. So I went out and bought a tin of Resene Hullabaloo and repainted it myself in a day. I was much happier."

Tracy is, in fact, very happy with the look of both rooms, and enjoys the functionality of the spaces. "They had to work well as both good spaces for a teenage family but also look good for guests." H



# ready for a facelift?

When your canvas is literally as big as a house, you want to make sure you get the paint colours right.

esene colour consultant Angela Fell has loads of advice to help you select colours for your home's exterior that work on a number of levels. Here are some tips and tricks to steer you in the right direction.

#### How and where do you start to select paint colours?

To find inspiration for a great exterior scheme, look all around you. Check out other houses in your neighbourhood and in areas that have similar house styles to yours. Keep a scrapbook of any ideas that you come across that you love. This will give you a great place to start as you will get a good feel for your personal style.

Check out the array of colour swatches at all Resene ColorShops and resellers, and browse through the pre-designed schemes on the Resene EzyPaint software (see overleaf for more details).

#### What's in fashion when wes to house exteriors?

We're opting for simpler schemes based on three to four colours - one for the main body of the house, another for the trims and another for the roof. The fourth is an accent that might be used on the fences. You might choose a fifth colour to be used for a striking front door. Soft mushroom shades have been fashionable, for example Resene Napa for the weatherboards, Resene Black



White for joinery and trims and Resene Ironsand for the roof. But we're starting to see a move into cleaner colours with greyer bases like Resene Half Pravda weatherboards, Resene Black White trims and Resene Grey Friars for the roof.

#### Is black the new white?

In the past five years, a popular architectural look has been to use black on exterior walls with pale trims to create a striking effect. Using this scheme may be limited, however, by the cladding or substrate you have on the outside of your home as many manufacturers have minimum light reflectance requirements that restrict you to using lighter colours. Darker colours generally absorb more heat from the sun than lighter colours, so may not be recommended on unstable substrates.

You can find out the LRV (light reflectance value) for a colour by looking at the back of Resene colour chips or check them out in the online Resene colour library – www.resene.com/colourlibrary.

#### And if I still want to use a darker colour?

Consider using the Resene CoolColour range formulated with special pigment technology to reflect more of the sun's energy than a standard colour. This keeps the coating and substrate cooler, reducing the likelihood of heat damage such as warping. Resene CoolColour technology is available in a wide range of colours and products suitable for a whole host of exterior projects.

## Are there other restrictions I might encounter?

Some councils place restrictions on colours that can be used on a house exterior to create more harmonious neighbourhoods or to make sure houses don't stand out too prominently from the natural environment. For example, Auckland City Council has a district plan for the Great Barrier/Hauraki Gulf. Check with your council for any restrictions in your area. Regional colour palettes for some locations are also available on the Resene website, www.resene.com.

If you're choosing bold colours, it might pay to discuss it with your neighbours first.

#### How can I choose a tried and true colour scheme?

If you're nervous about choosing colours, taking inspiration from other people's projects is a great way to see what the colours will look like. Bring in a photo of your home and let the Resene staff help you with your colour choices. They see a wide variety of successful decorating projects and tend to have a good idea of what will, and just as importantly won't, work. And they can provide you with tools and recommendations to help you with your project. You can also employ a professional colour consultant.

Always test your colour with a Resene testpot as colours will change depending on what they are painted onto and the quality of the light. Colours usually look much lighter outdoors, especially in our strong sunlight. They also change depending on other colours you put beside them, for example, a grey roof will make green walls look fresher. A high-gloss finish will make a colour look brighter than if you choose a lower sheen finish.

#### Then there's the Resene EzyPaint software.

This is great for selecting colours yourself. This virtual painting

software programme has a gallery of images with different architectural styles of homes from different eras to choose from. Choose a home like your own and paint it using one of more than 500 pre-designed colour scheme ideas or create your own unique scheme. You can even upload a photo of your home exterior and colour it in. If it doesn't look right, just keep trying out other colours until you create a look to suit you. Once you've painted your house in the virtual world, grab some testpots and try the colours out in the real world to make sure they give you the look you are after.

## What about schemes that honour the heritage aspects of my house?

If you have a heritage home from any era, check out the Resene Heritage colour range and discuss these with a colour consultant. These are classic colours and combinations that tend to outlast changes of fashion and will complement the architectural features of your house.



#### How can I disguise flaws?

High sheen paint is easier to keep clean but it does tend to highlight imperfections. Conversely, lower sheen paints like Resene Lumbersider hide imperfections but can be harder to clean. A good option is to choose a semi-gloss finish like Resene Sonyx 101 which hides more imperfections than a gloss but will also be easy to clean. Fences that have surface imperfections such as those found in rough sawn timber can look better in a low-sheen finish and a darker colour which will also better complement and offset your plants and landscaping.

# What about accents? Should I highlight the window joinery and trims? Should I go lighter or darker?

It comes back to the style of the house. Only highlight details if they are worth it. Contrasts are good to make the colour scheme more interesting but practise with Resene EzyPaint or testpots first to help you get the right balance between interesting and overkill. If all else fails, you can always paint over anything you decide you don't like. Make sure you live with it for a short while first though, as often you'll find the colours change in hue as they fully cure and you fall in love with your new colours. **H**

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# rub a dub dub

Having spent money on a smart new paint job for the house, a regular clean will keep it looking good, for longer.

magine if you were left to stand on a street corner, gathering road grime, wind-blown dirt, bird poop and mould on your south side without ever having a shower. You'd soon look pretty nasty.

It's often what we expect of our houses. That paint job may look shiny and robust now, but without regular cleaning it will not only look drab but have a shortened life.

Having your house washed might seem like something you can defer for another year but failure to treat accumulated mould, grime and salt will shorten the life of paint finishes, says Ray Tomlinson of JT Property Wash. He recommends your house is washed at least once a year. "Regular cleaning will extend the life of your exterior paintwork well beyond the standard 10 years, so it's an investment worth it in the long run."

Washing the house doesn't have to cost that much, especially if you're prepared to do it yourself. If you decide on the DIY option, however, don't simply grab a waterblaster and fire away. Waterblasting can eat into the surface and destroy the substrate below. Water can also creep through the windows and doors onto paint finishes and wallpaper.

It's the solutions you use for house washing that do all the work. No matter what type of cladding you have, the cleaning process is exactly the same. The only thing that varies is the strength of the

solution. Resene has a variety of good, cost-effective house wash solutions available for exterior cladding, fences, decks and patios as well as a fast acting mould and mould treatment.

Houses get particularly dirty in areas near high traffic flows. The Resene Paint Prep and Housewash solution is recommended by Ray as it immediately brings the wall surface back to life.

Moss, mould and lichen on any building will make it absorb moisture. On surfaces with moss and mould build up, which is common in our humid climate, Ray suggests the Resene Moss & Mould Killer which kills most common moulds and fungus in 48 hours. He says these are probably the most cost-effective on the market, too.

# It's the solutions you use for house washing that do all the work.

Follow the instructions on the product, he says. The correct method is to apply the solution using a back pack garden sprayer. "Handscrub all the windows and doors, then leave the solution on to soak in, then give it a gentle wash down. It doesn't need to be a waterblast. It can just be a house brush," says Ray.

If your home is really grubby, it's best to use a professional cleaner as they have access to stronger solutions. JT Property Wash has two commercial-grade products that are exclusively theirs which were specifically developed by Resene for tougher jobs.

Most house washers charge about \$300 to clean the average threebedroom house from the ground up to the soffits.

Before you commit, Ray says get a referral. "Also find out how long they've been in the business and whether they have a good track record. Be wary of fly-by-nighters, people who think they know what they're doing."

House wash companies will also clean gutters as they have equipment to clean while remaining on the ground. Says Ray: "It's not a good idea to go up a ladder. You've got to be careful when you're working from heights, whether you do it yourself or a contractor is doing it. Getting the cheapest price may not be a good idea if the contractor has a fall. With the new health and safety regulations, the cost of falls can become your responsibility." H



During the early 1990s, it was fashionable to use pastel colours in the garden, influenced by Vita Sackville West and Sissinghurst's White Garden. Nobody in New Zealand seemed to have heard of Vita's Hot Garden at that time so reds and oranges were perceived as the worst of taste. As for magenta - don't even mention it!

After seeing Monet's garden in late summer, and the jewel-like way the magentas of dark cosmos, dahlias and gladiolia were interspersed with the rich golds of rudbeckia, sunflowers and golden rod, I knew there would be no more pastel for me.

I couldn't wait to get home and plant those tasteless red flowers in my front garden to complement the Resene Guardsman Red door. At first I experimented with all the reds together - the cool magentas and crimsons, as well as the hot scarlet reds and terracotta - but found that in my small front garden, this just didn't work. It looked too spotty with no impact. I have seen since the cool and hot reds planted together in large gardens where there is plenty of space for each species and colour to be planted en masse, each making it's own statement interspersed with foliage, and it looked stunning.

In a small space, however, less is more, so I began to limit my palette, using only the hot scarlet reds, such as Geum 'Mrs Bradshaw' and terracotta reds such as the brownishred rose 'Colourbreak'. These are planted with bronze foliage plants such as flax and heuchera 'Amethyst' and also with lime green Helleborus corsica and Euphorbia



polychroma. Amongst these plantings are splashes of rich dark blue – sometimes delphiniums, sometimes the perennial forget-me-not *Omphalodes* cappadocica which echoes the blue painted trims of the house.

I fiddled with colour in the garden for a number of years until it was time to paint the house again. I resolved to be brave and a little outrageous this time, so I painted the weatherboards quite an intense mid-blue called Resene Bermuda Grey which blended well with the denim grey roof, and I used a brighter dark blue (Resene Madison) on the architraves and veranda posts. I also used more of the wonderful Resene Guardsman Red, not just on the front door, but also on the insides of the window trims and on terracotta pots for the veranda.

This was fine for the front garden where scarlet was king, but I didn't want to be confined to scarlet flowers in the side and back gardens as well, so I changed the colour of the trims and doors beyond my side fence, using lime green Resene Wasabi which also looks great with blue.

This freed me up with my colour choices in the side and back gardens, as almost any colour will look good with blue and lime green. Here, I indulged in the wonderful cool reds – the magentas, burgundys and even hot pinks which I also love. To these I have added purple, and even pale pink and touches of white. Again, I have used purplish/bronze foliage, as well as more blue flowers – blue is the most flexible colour in the garden offsetting almost any other colour. These cool red and pink tones do blend well against the blue of the house at the back and the lime green of the doors complements all.

The house will soon be in need of painting again, so where to next? In my head I have already worked out a colour scheme which will change everything... and it will not be demure. H

# a farm-inspired scheme transforms this courtyard




Wendy Twine, of Twine Landscape Design, suggests this alternative scheme:

This whimsical design is inspired by the farming landscape with a natural colour palette enhanced by modern interpretations of iconic rural features. An exposed aggregate courtyard is accessed via wooden 'cattlestops' traversing a water feature and a dry river bed of pebbles. This dichotomy emphasises the water conservation message, reflected in the chain downpipe and corrugated iron water tank. The cattlestops are linked by pavers inscribed with key rural words. The image of farm water troughs is evoked through raised concrete planters, embellished with grasses and rushes or quirkily named plants such as Ligularia 'Tractor Seat' and Lambs Ear. Barry Lett's dog sculpture sits patiently, awaiting his master and his day's work to begin. And at the end of the day there is a collapsible wooden bar table (not shown) with tractor seat bar stools reminiscent of old woolshed tables. A retractable awning creates shade in hot summers.

# a calm, uncluttered solution for this courtyard




Jennifer O'Neill-Joyce, of Gardens 2 Go, suggests this alternative scheme:

This is a contemporary space which offers an uncluttered and easy-care area to relax in. The lime and blue colours (Resene Limerick and Resene Venice Blue) of the window joinery are echoed throughout the space in the squab fabric and mosaic tiles set into the coloured and cut concrete. Green mondo grass softens the concrete, the grid pattern of which provides visual interest. The open cedar pergola, finished in Resene Limed Oak (stain finish), mimics the grid pattern below, allows for natural light and defines the space as an 'outdoor room'. Extending the pergola and ground plane grids past the lines of the house gives the sense of more space. The pendant light acts as a sculptural piece during the day, and makes the area highly usable at night. The setting is finished off with welcoming and comfortable chairs.

A striking seaside garden was the winner of this year's Resene Colour Award of Excellence at the NZ Institute of Landscape Architects awards.

inning the gold award in the residential section as well as the Resene Colour Award of Excellence, Ted Smyth's solution for a coastal garden includes swathes of grasses, sliced through with a dramatic 'diving board'. A collaborative relationship developed between Ted and the owners of the property – Ted encouraged them to work with nature by encircling the gardens in natives while the owners chose hot orange flowering exotic plants placed closer to the house.

The award judges said the "stunning garden has a sense of completeness. A carefully considered and orchestrated work of art, the site has been treated as a three dimensional canvas. Structurally the garden is a continuous flow of spaces that specifically address each of the clients' needs. Earthworks are minimal, in keeping with the sensitivity of the site... A restrained and consistent palette of materials, plant combinations and attention to detail makes this an outstanding example of landscape architecture's role in home-making." H

# the demo shed

Made almost entirely of second-hand materials, this cute shed is a tiny tribute to recycling.

ith design ideals embedded in iconic rural architecture and a typical can-do number-eight approach to problems, Darren and Sharon Hunter of Hunter Design and Red Shed have ended up with a glorified shed cum sleepout in which the only new products used are the bolts and Resene paint.

The shed is on the couple's holiday property in Martinborough and was originally conceived as a home for a ride-on mower, hence the ramp. "But we kept on improving it," says Darren, so once it was insulated with commercial-grade batts, wired for electricity and lined, it became a sleepout.

The cedar weatherboards (now painted Resene Waterborne Woodsman CoolColour tinted to Resene Crowshead) were bought off TradeMe, the windows are from a 1950s house rescued on their way to the tip, the roof is made from second-hand corrugated

iron, the interior cedar sarking was bought at Turners Auctions and the skirting around the bottom is made from left-over fence palings. Inside, the ply floor is painted Resene White, as are all of the exterior windows and trims.

The old segmented garage door (now in Resene Turbo) was owned by Darren's brother and would originally have had four panels. With only three panels left, it was no use as a garage door but perfect for a ride-on mower. At the back of the shed, a 1000-litre water tank catches rain water for the garden.

Of course, the improvements meant the mower was homeless once more, so another shed has been built. And now the couple, whose main home is in Paraparaumu, have a new project to keep them busy – upgrading an old garage into a holiday home and tending grapevines planted on the property. H
