### You will need:

- Clean cloth
- Hammer
- Nail punch
- Paintbrush
- Resene Waterborne Smooth Surface Sealer
- Resene testpots of Resene Bright Spark and Resene Burnt Umber
- Sandpaper
- Tin can



**Step one**  
Make a few drainage holes in the base of the tin using a hammer and nail punch – you might need a grown-up to help with this.



**Step two**  
Lightly sand the outside of the tin with sandpaper – this will help the paint to stick.



**Step three**  
Wipe off any sanding dust with a clean cloth.



**Step four**  
Apply one coat of Resene Waterborne Smooth Surface Sealer to the outside of the tin and allow two hours to dry.



**Step five**  
Paint the outside of the tin with two coats of Resene Bright Spark and allow two hours for each coat to dry.



**Step six**  
Paint stripes on the outside of the tin, as shown, using two coats of Resene Burnt Umber. Again, allow two hours for each coat to dry.

Transform a tin can into this cool bumble-bee striped plant pot with a little bit of help from Resene.



### Top tip:

You can also decorate a terracotta pot in the same way – just seal it with Resene Terracotta Sealer instead.



### Here's another idea:

This ladybird-inspired pot was painted with Resene Black and Resene Bright Red.
